BECCLES is a fine gateway to the valley of the River Waveney which forms the border between Suffolk and Norfolk. Modern trains call every hour, seven days a week, at its station, which has a welcoming café. The town is dominated by the unusual detached tower of its fine church and its seasonal attractions include a riverside lido and a museum (April to October). The church tower is open on certain days providing great views from the top. The historic Public Hall is the venue for concerts, dramatic productions and even a beer festival. In the summer, the Big Dog ferry gives trips from the lido up the river to Geldeston Locks, which can also be reached on foot along the Norfolk side of the river.

A delightful walk from Beccles station takes you over the railway line and along the Avenue to the extensive Common. From the Quay you can access a variety of walks by the river and across the marshes.

Beccles is an important destination for Broads holidays, as the river is navigable here and this helped the growth of the town, which received its charter from Elizabeth I. There are many independent shops, a variety of places to eat and drink and a Friday market. Look out for events such as the Antique Market, the Food & Drink Festival, the Carnival and the Christmas Lights SwitchOn. More information is available on the recently updated website https://visitbeccles.co.uk and there are seven Visitor Information points. (Library, Beccles Books, Quayside, Bear & Bells, Saxon's, Sports Store and Station Café.)

Buses leave the Old Market (service 580 on the Suffolk side, 581 on the Norfolk side of the valley) every day except Sunday. Geldeston on the Norfolk side is head of navigation with its popular Locks Inn Community Pub by the river and Wherry Inn in the village centre. Ellingham has a picturesque water mill. You can go contactless on the buses and also on the bus from Halesworth to Bungay.

BUNGAY is a historic market town which you can reach by bus from **Norwich** (service 41 and X41) and **Diss** (service 581) via **Harleston**, as well as from **Halesworth** (X41) and **Beccles**. Here you can explore the romantic ruins of a 12th century castle and see the unique mining galleries left from the castle siege of 1174. As in Beccles, there are streets full of delightful Georgian architecture. In the town centre stands a 17th century **Butter Cross** and there are many opportunities to sample local food and drink in independent shops, cafés and pubs.

The town has numerous speciality shops: Market Day is Thursday and special seasonal markets (Christmas Market, Garden Street Market and Antiques Market) are also very popular. The Fisher Theatre, dating from 1828 offers a broad range of programmes, performances and art

Bungay has an abundance of folklore and legend. You can find the ancient Druidstone in the churchyard and examine the doorway of St Mary's Church for the claw marks left by the demon dog Black Shuck, who appeared in the church during a summer thunderstorm in 1577.

Take a walk round Outney Common along the river and see if you can spot an otter, heron or kingfisher or follow the Bigod Way footpath along quiet lanes and farm tracks before ascending Bath Hills for a fine view of the Valley.

You can follow the Angles Way to Beccles (7 miles). It is mainly on the Suffolk side of the valley and can be done in stages using the 580 or 581 bus (www.eastsuffolkline.com/walks).

Canoe hire is also available all year in Bungay at Outney Meadow Caravan Site with possible sightings of swans, herons, kingfishers otters and in the summer damselflies and dragonflies (www.outneymeadow.co.uk/canoeing).

There are Visitor Information Points at the library, town council offices and castle.

You can also explore the valley by bicycle – in which case the Norfolk side is less hilly! Beccles Library has a good selection of cycle ride leaflets.

Service **581** continues to Harleston and then Diss, passing along Victoria Road a few minutes walk from the rail station.


